Bishop's Column

'We live in an increasingly secular world'- as the statistics and anecdotal evidence tell us. Consequently, in addition to our own experience, there is a greater and greater need to witness to our faith in that forum, as well as to proclaim the truth in the absolutes that the world so often now rejects. We are not infrequently told that we should keep to proclaiming - or at least living - the Gospel, and not get involved in politics. However the influence of one upon the other cannot be separated.

We prepare to celebrate in a few weeks' time, the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem in which we see one of the most blatant non-political statements of our faith. '... Christ's entry into Jerusalem on a donkey was a repudiation of both Jewish and Roman military triumphs ...' writes Max Harris in his book Christ on a Donkey -Palm Sunday, Triumphal Entries and Blasphemous Pageants. It was a humble, peaceful act, an act of the Suffering Servant (cf. Isaiah 42:1-9; 49:1-6; 50:4-9; 52:13-53:12) and the very antithesis of miliary, political or any of the other kind of power. As such, it was a very powerful statement to the rulers, governors and political leaders of the time and since; indeed, a parody of them.

Egeria, in her early 5th century *Diary of a Pilgrimage*, describes how the Great Week begins at the Church on the Mount of Olives at the seventh hour with readings, hymns and antiphons until the eleventh hour when the Palm Sunday Gospel (Mk.11:1-10) is read. Then 'all the people rise immediately and walk down from the top of the Mount of Olives'. Children, especially, are mentioned, as too are 'distinguished ladies and men of consequence' some 'carrying palms, others olive branches' led by the bishop (who is 'on foot') moving 'very slowly so that people will not tire' arriving at the Anastasis (place of the harrowing of hell) by evening. 'Vespers is celebrated, a prayer is said at the Cross and the people are dismissed.'

This account betrays any sign of triumphal pomp.

It was only some eighty years after Charlemagne (748-814) rode into Rome, that processions, and including Palm Sunday processions, began to resemble royal entries in cities.

Allusions of Christ's entry into Jerusalem not only set a precedent for subsequent appropriations of the language and iconography of Palm Sunday by rulers of church and state, but also for elite Palm Sunday processions themselves to assume the imagery and the language of royal entries.

From the eleventh century on the procession had a triumphal character. They became in effect a feast of Christ the King. The new Holy Week Ordo of 1955 returned some of the medieval traditions of having a procession of all the people, not just the clergy. It was the Missal of 1970 which acknowledged the changed living, social and political conditions. The liturgy was adapted to what we have to-day (*Roman Missal* 3rd Edition 2010) referring not to a triumphal entry but the '... entrance of Christ the Lord into Jerusalem to accomplish his Paschal Mystery.'

It is Christ the Suffering Servant and the Paschal Mystery that we are called to live and proclaim in society. In so doing we cannot but witness to our communities and nation an alternative way to that put forward by many government and world leaders who seem to be more intent on short term politics than long term policies. As a General Election approaches ever nearer, we have a responsibility to look to, and work for, the defence of Catholic values in Parliament and public life, and the promotion of the common good. May The Great Week be for you a particular time of

Praying with St Beuno's Outreach: 'As one friend to another ...'



In this monthly reflection, St Beuno's Outreach invites you to pray with an image and a verse of Scripture or other material.



As we journey further into Lent this month, it is good to remember that this is a 'sober' time, but not a 'sombre' one (a word that comes from the Latin *sub umbra* or 'under the shadows', meaning dismal and gloomy). Indeed, Lent can be a time of gladness when we draw nearer to God, perhaps helped by traditional Lenten practices. **Fasting** can help us develop internal freedom. **Repentance** and **forgiveness**, sometimes through the Sacrament of Reconciliation, lie at the heart of our faith. **Almsgiving** may prompt us not just to give money, but also time, support and friendship – and perhaps a listening ear to someone who needs it. All of these are well-tried ways in which we can co-operate with God's Spirit at work within us.

The season of Lent is also a special time to let God come close to us in other ways. As we reflect on the magnitude of Jesus's love for us, shown particularly in his Passion, death and resurrection, we can also reflect on our own love for God and for one another. We ask God for the strength to carry our own cross as we journey towards Holy Week, placing the Lord right at the centre of our life, and putting the interests of others before our own.

Our image this month is the work of Revd John Stuart ('Stushie'), a Scottish Presbyterian pastor who now works in East Tennessee. His unique crayon and digital art is created specially for use in the liturgy and for children's worship, and is also used widely for newsletters and publicity, as well as to aid prayer and reflection. Take a moment to read the verses slowly and prayerfully, perhaps aloud or on your breath if you can. Then stay with any one line or phrase that 'speaks' to you more particularly.

Ask yourself why this is so ... what links it to your daily life? When have you experienced the joy of God's help?

Perhaps you notice the promises the psalmist makes to the Lord: *teaching his ways*, voicing out loud his *goodness*, *declaring praise* for him.

This may lead you to consider whether you would like to do the same.

During this healing time of Lent, you might want to ask God's Spirit to help you strengthen your resolve to be more *humble and contrite*, trusting that God will never turn you away.

This month's text comes from one of the best-known psalms, Psalm 50 (51), sometimes referred to as the *Miserere*. St Augustine, Gregory the Great, and Martin Luther all loved this text, and there are prayerful musical settings by many composers, including Allegri and J. S. Bach. We say verses from this psalm at Mass on the Fifth Sunday in Lent (Year B) and on other occasions, including Ash Wednesday.

Give me again the joy of your help; with a spirit of fervour sustain me, that I may teach transgressors your ways and sinners may return to you.

O rescue me, God my helper, and my tongue shall ring out your goodness. O Lord, open my lips and my mouth shall declare your praise.

For in sacrifice, you take no delight, burnt offering from me you would refuse; my sacrifice, a contrite spirit, a humble, contrite heart you will not spurn. Psalm 50 (51) vv. 14-19

At the end of your prayer, what do you want to say to Jesus?

Speak to him as one friend to another.

"Walk in newness of life" (Rom 6:4) is the theme chosen by Pope Francis for this year's 24 Hours for the Lord celebration.

The purpose of the event is to put the sacrament of reconciliation back at the centre of the pastoral life of the Church, and consequently, of our communities, parishes, and all ecclesial realities. This is the centre of the Gospel message: the Mercy of God, which gives us the certainty that before the Lord no one will find a judge, but rather will find a father who welcomes him, consoles him and also shows him the way to renewal.

Each parish of the Diocese has been invited to take one hour, or more if they wish for a time of Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and the opportunity for the celebration of the Sacrament of Penance (Confession) A full list of Churches and times will be published as soon as the information has been submitted and collated.

A pastoral resource is provided to offer some suggestions to enable parishes and Christian communities to prepare to implement this initiative. These are, of course, suggestions that can be adapted according to local needs and customs.



News from the wider Community



CROSS OF WALES

In a ceremony at Goldsmiths' Hall in London His Majesty King Charles III presented a centenary gift of the "Cross of Wales" to the Church in Wales.

The Cross contains shards of The True Cross, originally given to the King by Pope Francis. His Majesty formally presented the Cross to the Anglican Church in Wales.

The Cross of Wales was the Processional Cross used in the coronation of King Charles III in May 2023.

The gift from Pope Francis had been made as an ecumenical gesture.

The ceremony, on January 25th was attended by the retired Archbishop of Cardiff, Archbishop George Stack, who is Chair of the Patrimony Committee of the Bishops' Conference.

"A symbol, a sign, a sacramental expression"

Speaking after the official presentation, Archbishop George Stack described the processional cross as "a symbol, a sign, a sacramental expression of the unity of all people who believe in Jesus Christ" – for Wales and beyond.

"Pope Francis was very anxious to make this ecumenical gesture," he said. "It's around the Cross that all Christians gather with their different histories, devotions, and approaches to the mystery of faith."

Describing how the Cross of Jesus Christ lies at the crossroads of human existence, Archbishop Stack quoted his favourite saying from the Carthusian monks who used to live at Charterhouse in London, "the Cross stands still while the world turns."

"As we look at the Cross, venerate the Cross, embrace the Cross, we give thanks to God in Jesus Christ for reconciling the world to himself, in love, in forgiveness, and in reconciliation."

On coming to Wales, the Cross of Wales will initially be displayed at St Deiniol's Cathedral, Bangor, the seat of the current Archbishop of Wales, Archbishop Andrew John, before beginning a tour around all the Welsh cathedrals with the aim of giving everyone an opportunity to see it. Its use going forward will be shared between the Anglican and Catholic Churches in Wales.

Archbishop Andrew John said:

"The Cross of Wales is a hugely significant ecumenical symbol. Taking its inspiration from the earliest roots of our Christian history, and inscribed in Welsh with the words of St David, the Cross will remind us all of the heart of our faith. It not only provides a focus of unity across our different traditions but will also be a lasting sign of The King's respect and affection for Wales."

The Design of the Cross

Designed and made by master silversmith Michael Lloyd, in consultation with the Royal Collection, the Cross of Wales is crafted from recycled silver bullion, provided by the Royal Mint at Llantrisant; a shaft of Welsh windfall timber; and a stand of Welsh slate.

Words from the last sermon of St David are chased on the back of the Cross in Welsh: "Byddwch lawen. Cadwch y ffydd. Gwnewch y Pethau Bychain", which translates as:

"Be joyful. Keep the faith. Do the little things."

Hallmarks

In compliance with the Hallmarking Act, the silver elements of the Cross bear a full hallmark (of the London Assay Office), including the Royal Mark (leopard's head) which was applied by The King himself in November 2022 when visiting The Goldsmiths' Centre in London.

The cross was blessed by the Archbishop of Wales, ahead of the Coronation, at Holy Trinity Church, Llandudno, on 19 April 2023.


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
Over this and the next two editions of CLARION Bishop Peter wants to open the financial books of the Diocese to remove some of the mystery and absence of understanding that may exist with regard to the Diocesan Finances. The full audited accounts are, of course, to be found on the Charity Commission (CC) website where they are posted. For the detail of your own parish's accounts you need to ask your **Finance** priest and Parish parish Committee (PFC). (Such a Committee exists under Canon Law.)

More narrative and explanation about the Diocesan finances and the figures will be given over the next couple of months.

This month, Bishop Peter is happy to begin with his own account.

Next month there will be the accounts for Central Services i.e. the Curia and Administration of the Diocese and in the May issue of the Clarion some explanation of the whole annual accounts as reported and seen on the CC website will be given.





These accounts are for the financial year ending 6th April 2023 the details of which are shown in graphic form.

Income

The total income to the Bishop's Account was £31,503.00 of which nearly 80% had to be drawn down from Diocesan funds, i.e. the Levy upon parishes, but which was a decrease of £2,643.00 on the previous year. For the previous year (2021-2022) the income was £32,230.00 so in the year reported there was a decrease of £727.00

Expenditure

The total Expenditure from the Bishop's Account was £32,300.00. For the previous year (2021-22) the expenditure was £29,856.00. This is an increase of £1,647.00 almost all of which (£1,502.00) was for greater travel/mileage expenses; noting that the Allowance given to the Bishop was down by £700.00 and personal Housekeeping expenditure increased by only £22.00

POPE FRANCIS ON EUCHARISTIC ADORATION

"One cannot know the Lord without this habit of adoring, of adoring in silence. I believe, if I am not mistaken, this prayer of adoration is the prayer least known by us, it is the one we do the least", as if it were a "waste of time before the Lord, before the mystery of Jesus Christ". Instead, we should rediscover "the silence of Adoration: he is the Lord and I adore him".

Morning meditation, 20th October 2016

"The rediscovery of prayer in various forms, and particularly Eucharistic Adoration, is a source of hope for the Church to grow and take root."

Address, 2nd December 2016

"God's word invites us clearly to "stand against the wiles of the devil" (Eph 6:11) and to "quench all the flaming darts of the evil one" (Eph 6:16). ... For this spiritual combat, we can count on the powerful weapons that the Lord has given us: faith-filled prayer, meditation on the word of God, the celebration of Mass, Eucharistic adoration, sacramental Reconciliation, works of charity, community life, missionary outreach."

Apostolic Exhortation Rejoice and Be Glad, 19th March 2018

The prayer of adoration happens only when one enters into God's mystery. Let us ask the Lord for the grace that the Church may live in the concreteness of everyday life and also in that "concreteness" of the mystery. If she cannot do so, she will be just half a Church, a pious association, going ahead by prescriptions but without a sense of adoration. Entering into the mystery is not about dreaming. Entering into the mystery is precisely this: to adore. Entering into the mystery is doing today what we will do in the future. When we will have arrived in God's presence: adore.

As a "blah, blah, blah", half asleep before the tabernacle because I don't know how to talk to the Lord. Do I pray? How do I pray? Only in adoration, only in the presence of the Lord, do we truly rediscover our taste and passion evangelization. Oddly enough, we have lost the prayer of adoration; and everyone, priests, bishops consecrated men and women, need to recover it, this ability to be quiet in the Lord's presence. Mother Teresa [of Calcutta], busy about so many things in life, never neglected adoration, even at times when her faith was shaken and she wondered if it was all true or not. A similar moment of darkness was also experienced by Thérèse of the Child Jesus. In prayer, we overcome the temptation to carry out a "ministry of nostalgia and regrets".


